<u>Summary</u>

Introduction and Apologies:

Zoe Fry (Outstanding Society director and nurse) opened the meeting, noting apologies which will be published online.

EQ Care Group Update:

Louise shared that EQ Care operates four care homes and is expanding. They use Nourish for care records and Camascope for electronic systems.

Vivaldi Project Feedback:

Lianne from EQ Care highlighted ongoing challenges in understanding the Vivaldi project and the need to engage more with residents and families. Zoe suggested short sessions and relatives meetings to improve clarity.

General Project Update (UCL):

Laura reported delays in receiving NHS England data but noted progress on a podcast about social care research and a new care home-focused project.

Dashboard Development (UKHSA):

Graeme provided an update on dashboard approval and development, emphasising user research groups to refine functionality.

Data Pipeline and Benchmarking (UCL):

Oliver explained the data linkage process and benchmarking challenges, emphasising the need for accurate comparisons.

Website Review:

Lucy is reviewing the website to reflect project growth and welcomes improvement suggestions.

Upcoming Events:

Zoe shared plans for meetings with CQC inspectors, the Care Show (October 2024), and a parliamentary reception (January 2026).



Q&A

- Q: How can we better understand the Vivaldi project? A: Zoe offered to provide:
 - Bespoke one-to-one meetings
 - Short information sessions
 - Meetings with relatives to clarify the system and its benefits

Q: Are there issues with the data affecting care home residents? A: No. Data issues are related only to linking and formatting, not the actual resident data.

- Q: How will care homes be compared in the dashboard?
- A: Oliver emphasised a cautious and fair comparison approach, factoring in:
 - Home size
 - Care type (e.g., nursing, dementia)
 - Regional differences
 - Recognition of limitations in making direct comparisons

Q: Can homes provide more detailed information during sign-up? A: Initially, the sign-up process was intentionally light-touch. Future improvements may include:

- Leveraging existing CQC data
- Introducing optional survey fields
- Exploring live data sources to minimise admin workload

Q: How accurate are hospital admission and prescription codes?

- Hospital admissions: Some subjectivity in coding
- Prescriptions: Considered more reliable
- The team acknowledges there are inherent limitations in both data types
